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A MESSAGE FROM THE OFFICE...

At this time of year, we reflect on our school goals and measure our effectiveness at Professional Development Days and Staff Meetings. Below are the goals agreed upon by staff that promote Literacy and Numeracy proficiency as well as Self-Regulation.

McKay Public School Goals

To develop a positive community of lifelong learners that take ownership for their actions, respect themselves and others, and show resilience when faced with challenges.

School Numeracy Goal: If we provide an engaging comprehensive math program using math tools, **then** students will take risks, persevere, value mistakes and engage in math talk.

School Literacy Goal: If we provide an engaging comprehensive literacy program, then students will be able to think critically and communicate effectively.

School Wellness Goal (Self-Regulation): If we provide a safe, caring, healthy and inclusive environment for all, then our community will learn, grow and achieve together.

Pink Shirt Day (and Everyday)

Here is a snippet of the Globe & Mail article:

"David Shepherd, Travis Price and their teenage friends organized a high-school protest to wear pink in sympathy with a Grade 9 boy who was being bullied [for wearing a pink shirt]...[They] took a stand against bullying when they protested against the harassment of a new Grade 9 student by distributing pink T-shirts to all the boys in their school. 'I learned that two people can come up with an idea, run with it, and it can do wonders,' says Mr. Price, 17, who organized the pink protest. 'Finally, someone stood up for a weaker kid.' So Mr. Shepherd and some others headed off to a discount store and bought 50 pink tank tops. They sent out a message to school-mates that night, and the next morning they hauled the shirts to school in a plastic bag. As they stood in the foyer handing out the shirts, the bullied boy walked in. His face spoke volumes. 'It looked like a huge weight was lifted off his shoulders,' Mr. Price re-called. The bullies were never heard from again."

McKay School challenges its staff and students to commit to a bully-free lifestyle and to consider wearing pink on Feb. 22, 2017.

Problem-Based Mathematics Instruction - Gallery Walk, Bansho, and Congress

Problem-based instruction provides a context that grounds abstract mathematics. It allows students to engage in mathematical reasoning and critical thinking that leads to questions and understanding of important and foundational mathematical ideas.

Prior to working on a mathematical problem, students are engaged in a short activity that leads mathematically to the problem. During problem-based mathematical instruction, students solve mathematical problems, often with a classmate or group of students. The solution illustrates what students know and understand. The teacher will encourage students to explore, notice patterns, develop efficient strategies, and generalize mathematical ideas. New learning is acquired as students view, discuss, make connections, and see mathematical relationships in the solutions that are presented.

During a gallery walk, students look at the solutions of their peers. This may include asking and answering questions or writing comments and/or questions. Bansho comes from the Japanese lesson study. It means board writing. A math congress comes from research of Cathy Fosnot. In both instructional strategies, student work forms the foundation for mathematical learning. Students explain their mathematical ideas to the mathematical community and justify and defend their thinking. Students see themselves as part of a mathematical community in which all thinking is both honoured and productive.



TRY AT HOME ACTIVITY - ZOOM BALL

Materials:

- Two 1 litre plastic pop bottles
- Scissors
- Optional: Coloured construction paper
- Masking tape
- Ribbons
- Two plastic ring six pack holders
- Two 2.4 metre strings• An adult helper
- 1. Ask your adult helper to cut the bottoms off of the two plastic pop bottles.
- 2. Fit the bottles together so there is a neck on either end. Tape the bottles together to form a football shape.
- 3. Cover the bottles with construction paper and ribbon if you want to decorate your zoom
- 5. Take the six-pack holders and cut the rings apart to make four two-loop handles.
- 4. Thread the two strings through the bottles.6. Tie a set of handles to the ends of each string.
- 7. Get at friend and you are ready to play. Each player holds onto two handles and pulls on the strings until they are tight. Slide the zoom ball to one end. When it is at your end snap your hands apart to send the zoom ball back to your friend. To catch the zoom ball, keep your hands together.

EXPLANATION:

The pushing action of the strings sets the zoom ball in motion. When the zoom ball reaches the other end of the strings, an opposite pushing action, your friend snapping the strings, stops the ball for a moment and then sends it in the reverse direction.

AN IMPORTANT MESSAGE ABOUT INCLEMENT WEATHER PROCEDURES


Mornings at McKay

INSTRUCTIONS TO REGISTER ON THE NIAGARA REGION CHILD CARE REGISTRY:

WEBSITE: https://niagara.onehsn.com.

- The registration and login section is displayed at the top/right portion of the screen. If you
 do not currently have an account click "Create an Account";
- You will then be asked to input your email...you MUST have an email account to do this. Once you have done this a link will be sent to your email address. Click on this link to continue;
- You will then be asked to create a passphrase. It will let you know if the phrase is good by changing to a green colour. If it does not change to green, your password will not be accepted. It should be 8 characters and include capitals, symbols and numbers. Click "Set PassPhrase".
- 4. Click Begin Application;
- 5. Input your address and click "next step";
- 6. If you are not employed by an agency you can simply click "Next Step" to continue;
- 7. Once you have confirmed the information is correct, click "Save and Add Child"
- Input your child's information. You can put part of the school name and it should give you a drop down box...for the viability test please input "DSBN – school name";
- 9. If you are not being referred by an agency, you can simply click "Next Step"
- 10. The next screen asks if you are in need of financial assistance, you have three choices, you must pick one and click "Next Step"
- 11. Confirm everything is correct and click "Continue and Apply to Programs"
- 12. Your preferred start date for this year MUST BE September 5, 2017, this is the first day of school; Complete the full screen and click "Next Step"; If you wish to click the other boxes you must click "select all" first in order to remove the check marks from all boxes, you can then choose...it is not mandatory to choose these however;
- A list of schools/centres will now come up, your school will start with DSBN "school name";
 Click "Next Step"
- 14. You will then be asked to review the application; If everything is correct you can click "Save and return to home screen";
- 15. You can add more children at this point;

Cell Phone Policy

At McKay, we recognize the fact that many of our students bring cell phones to school, and also that parents may prefer that their children have phones with them on the way to and from school, for safety reasons. We certainly support anything that contributes to the safety and wellbeing of our students. However, we also take into consideration that cell phones can have a negative impact if they are misused in the school environment.



A student with access to a cell phone during a lesson can become distracted from his or her learning, and there have been numerous accounts of students texting one another during class. There have also been accounts of cyber-bullying occurring during the school day through cell phone communication.

With this in mind, our policy is to allow students to bring cell phones to school, provided that they remain out of sight and are not used on school property without teacher approval. If a student needs to call home, they will be allowed to use the school phone. If parents need to contact their child, they may call the school.

Should a student refrain from complying with the cell phone policy by using their cell phone without permission at school, the following steps will be taken:

The first time, the student will be asked to put the phone away.

The second time, the phone will be taken away and returned to the student at the end of the day; parents will be informed.

The third time, the phone will be taken away and the parent will be asked to come and pick up the phone.

Cold Weather Alerts at DSBN

Winter is a time of wonder for many children; many enjoy the crisp air, the freshly fallen snow and participating in a whole host of exciting winter sports and activities.

Although we feel that it is important for students to spend some time outside each day exercising and socializing with peers, there are times when bitterly cold temperatures and other inclement weather conditions require that we keep children inside.

Because Niagara is such a large geographical area, and weather conditions may vary from one municipality to the next, the decision on whether or not to hold recess outdoors is made by the individual school principal. When making this decision, principals will often consult with neighbouring schools, talk with parents as they arrive in the morning, and if the decision to send children outside is made, we will equip yard duty staff with walkie-talkies so that they can communicate with the office to sound the bells to bring students in earlier.

The health and well-being of our students is a top priority at the District School Board of Niagara, and if it is determined that the weather conditions pose a risk to their safety, students will be kept indoors. Extreme cold weather alerts issued by the Niagara Region are often good indicators that students will stay inside, or the amount of ice on the tarmac prohibits safe play outside. The climber will be closed until the ground thaws.

Even when temperatures are not low enough to necessitate an indoor recess, it still may be quite cold outside so please ensure that your child has the appropriate winter gear.

Here are a few tips to help ensure that your child stays warm during the cold winter months:

- Try to send children to school with plenty of layers, such as long underwear, sweatshirts, sweaters and pullovers. Layering their clothing will allow them to add or remove items depending on the weather.
- Students should have a warm winter coat that repels snow, sleet and rain.
- Warm socks and boots will keep their feet warm and dry in the snow and slush.
- Hats are one of the most important parts of dressing warmly in the winter. A thick winter hat will keep students from losing too much of that essential body heat.
- Put on a good pair of mittens that are water-resistant as well. Gloves or mittens will keep kids' hands dry and warm and protect their skin from being damaged by the wind and chill.
